Why Do We Need a Campaign?

For nearly 100 years, Rippowam Cisqua School has provided students with a rich, challenging educational program that encourages them to take intellectual risks and discover and explore their talents to the fullest.

To guarantee that Rippowam Cisqua will flourish well into the 21st century, the trustees and school administration developed and adopted a Strategic Plan that focuses on three key areas that contribute to our core values:

People

To attract, retain, and develop a first class faculty and student body;

Place

To modernize existing facilities that will serve and attract students and faculty;

Program

To foster an environment that supports our faculty and encourages student achievement and personal growth.

Executing our Strategic Plan

The modernization of our facilities will take two phases. The first phase — the renovation of the athletics fields on the Upper Campus — was completed in 2014. The renovation of the entrance to the Lower Campus will be completed by September 2015.

The next and largest phase is a comprehensive renovation of the Upper Campus. This project will improve site circulation, both vehicular and pedestrian, and create new and enhanced program spaces and classrooms as well as a new cafeteria.

A new front building will redefine the entry of the school and house an innovative media center and library on the top floor, two new science labs on the ground floor, and expansive art spaces on the lower level which will open onto a new courtyard.

These renovations enable RCS to:

Cultivate

Provide learning environments and resources to reflect the quality of the educational experience at RCS.

Innovate

Enhance our infrastructure of technology that facilitates 21st century learning and provides maximum impact and flexibility today and into the future.

Protect

Enhance safety and security through thoughtful management of vehicular and pedestrian circulation.

Conserve

Commit to a culture of sustainability and conservation. The proposed project includes photovoltaic panels, a green roof and a geo-thermal heating system.


Compete




